We the People, an HIV Policy Center for all Californians, observe TDOR to honor the memory of Transgender Californians whose lives were lost in acts of fatal anti-transgender violence.

CALIFORNIA FACTS

The murders of **14 trans women** have been documented since 2013

On average trans women were **age 36** when killed; Black trans women were **age 31**



50% of murdered trans women were Black

67% were murdered by a current or previous romantic partner

Preventing violence and protecting the lives of transgender Californians is key to *Ending the HIV Epidemic* for all Californians. Yet, data to inform this process is limited.

Trans inclusive state HIV surveillance data helps to fund tailored prevention programming

Lack of trans inclusive state violence surveillance data limits tailored prevention programming

State school climate data documents high rates of bullying and violence among trans youth

Implications & Next Steps

TDOR is a call to collective action to bridge HIV and violence prevention responses

Efforts to *End the HIV Epidemic* in California must center the health and safety of Black trans women

Policies and programs that protect against anti-trans violence will reduce HIV disparities
